

Technical Article: By Tech Advisor Brian Richards



ask a question, and hopefully, at least to yourself, you will give an honest answer ... have you read, or at least reviewed that special book you got with your motorcycle, called the "Owner's Manual"? I know a lot of us (and I do include myself in the "us") operate under the old adage "if all else fails, read the manual"!

Well, there is a whole lot of really significant information in there that could prove VERY beneficial to a smooth partnership between you and your motorcycle. Knowing how certain pieces of equipment are supposed to function, and be used, can really make a difference in fully enjoying your ride.

One of the more significant sections that you, as the owner, need to be aware of and pay attention to is the Maintenance Schedule. Be sure to look in the index in the back of your owner's manual for "Schedule, Maintenance" and check out the page(s) indicated. Of particular use in that section is a chart showing items that need to be watched, and the frequency of service for each. Keeping to the indicated schedule will help your motorcycle stay in proper functioning condition, as well as keeping it covered under the warranty.

The "Maintenance Schedule" chart is very important, but hopefully is fairly easy to interpret. There are generally two main sections, one that covers the "emissions-related items", and one that covers the "non-emissions-related items". The codes shown in the chart are pretty straight-forward, "I" for inspect, "C" for clean, "R" for replace. The individual columns are for the odometer readings for the recommended interval for servicing each item. The manual does have notes explaining some of the requirements, and also differentiates what Honda feels are things that

can be done by a reasonably mechanically-inclined owner and which it recommends be done by your qualified Honda Service Department. Some of these more involved procedures can require special tools and knowledge, while others are pretty straight -forward. Many of those procedures have been done in the past at the chapter's annual "Maintenance Day" at Tom & Kathy Peck's home, especially the simpler ones like changing the oil, or replacing spark plugs, etc.

One of the more significant maintenance items from a safety perspective is the inspection of the steering head bearings. Your Owner's Manual will list the recommended interval, and it also lists this as an item best done by a qualified Honda Service Technician. I have not gotten deep into this process myself, but I know that Tom Peck has, and with the right tools, and proper know-how, it is not a major undertaking. But it is something that can significantly affect the safety of your motorcycle. A good sign of potential problems is a front-end wobble, or when turning your handlebars from left to right you get an indentation feeling in the center point. These can be signs that your steering stem bearings may be worn out. If you have either or both of these, you might want to consider alternatives, a great many Gold Wing GL1800 owners have upgraded their steering head bearings to what are called "tapered bearings", which have proven very effective at eliminating the front-end wobble, and many reported much better handling with the advantage of extended maintenance intervals.

Another section that while not as "important" for the proper functioning of your motorcycle, can make a major impact on how much you enjoy riding it, is the "Audio Systems". There is a LOT of important information in that section about the audio systems contained in your motorcycle, including the best way to set the parameters of the different pieces. There are several different versions of audio systems available, depending on your motorcycle model (GL1500, GL1800, etc.), year (later years had more advanced systems with more options), and level within the year (such as the base model or models with more features, like a navigation system, of XM satellite radio). The Owner's Manual will go into detail about how to set the different systems up to do what YOU want it to, there are a myriad of possible combinations, depending on the individual preferences of you, the owner. But I will try to cover a few of the basics.

One audio system that confuses a lot of owners is the CB, and the biggest culprit of CB problems/confusion is the *"squelch"*. The squelch control on a CB radio filters out interference from atmospheric conditions or chatter from nearby channels or others on the same channel that are farther away but have a strong signal (like that trucker with a booster on his CB that overpowers everything around).

The geography of your location can also cause interference during CB communication. The higher you have the squelch setting on your CB, the more "filtering" is done, up to and beyond the point that you may not even be able to hear the others in your riding group, especially if you are spread out a fair distance. But if you have the setting too low, you can get a lot of extraneous noise, and hissing. So you want to find that happy medium, which can change depending on a number of different conditions, so remember that what you had it set at for that ride you took with your friends last week, may not be good for today's ride.

Another hint about the CB, that I had covered in the Tech article in the May 2015 chapter newsletter but will touch on again here, is the transmit delay. Honda's CB has an internal capacitor that stores power to be used to transmit your voice when you press the "PTT" (Push-To-Talk) button. However, when not being used, i.e., you have been riding for awhile and have not used your CB to talk to anyone, the capacitor's power storage drains away, so the next time you press the PTT, there is a slight delay until it can build up enough power to send your voice out. What this means is that if you don't press the PTT and count to at least 3 before saying anything, those first few words do not get transmitted. If you have only said a very brief message, such as a warning like "debris, left track", what your fellow riders might hear, if they hear anything at all, might just be "...track". So remember to press the PTT, count to 3, THEN start talking.

One useful feature on the AM/FM radio for us Wingers, who like to take longer rides to areas outside our local area, is the A.SEL RPT/RDM. This can be helpful when you're beyond the broadcast range of the local radio stations you normally listen to, such as gone out-of-state to a rally, or maybe to Wing Ding. To activate the "Auto Select" feature, push the A.SEL RPT/RDM button. "A.SEL RPT/ RDM" should appear in the display, and the system will go into scan mode for several seconds. It automatically scans both bands, AM and FM, looking for stations with strong signals. It stores the frequencies of both the AM and FM stations it finds into the preset buttons. You can then use the preset buttons to listen to a station that has a strong signal where you are. Of note, Auto Select does NOT erase the home frequencies that you have preset. When you return home and want to go back to listening to your usual stations, turn off the Auto Select by pressing the A.SEL RPT/RDM button, and all your preset buttons will be back to the local home stations you had them set to.

There is a lot of other very useful information contained in your Owner's Manual. You might want to consider, on that lazy, quiet evening that you're not doing anything else, picking up your Owner's Manual and looking through the Contents listing for something that interests you, and check it out.


August is here and it seems like wherever you ride the heat is still extreme. Our nearby mountain roads may offer a few degrees of temperature relief, however those skinny, twisty roads often bring special hazards. Sharp blind curves often have a surprise vehicle coming toward you, and all too many times the driver of that vehicle is partially on your side of the double yellows! As you approach these type of tight curves take a glance at the lines on the pavement. If they appear to be severely worn or almost gone, you should almost assume that most drivers usually cut the corner so tightly that an invasion of your road space is likely. Find the best compromise between sight distance and a suitable safety cushion, and watch for those worn lines to appear again soon.

Hey, how about a rider education 2 -fer? Do many of you have a second bike beside your GoldWing? Maybe a scooter, or like me, a cruiser bike that you just can't give up? Chances are, that second bike isn't ridden as often as your Wing. How old are the tires on that bike?

Having tires that have good tread depth can give you a false sense of security. If the bike is stored in a garage with moderate temperatures, tires can often last about ten years. Inspect the tires' sidewalls often for dry rot cracks and the tread area for any splits in the grooves. If the bike is stored outside in a carport or in a storage shed, consider replacing those tires sooner for your own safety. I'll explain tire date coding at our monthly gathering.

Cook the butter, sugar and evaporated milk until thickened, about 5-7 minutes after it starts to boil, stirring occasionally. When thickened, add the nuts and coconut. Pour over the cake and let cool.




