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
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From Your Senior Chapter B Directors, Tom & Kathy Peck














Just a few words from your Assistant Chapter Director

Chinese Cole Slaw

1 package Broccoli Slaw Mix

6 to 8 green onions (chop all to include blades)

1/2 cup up to 1 cup Sunflower seeds

1 package of Beef Ramen Noodles (crumbled)

*(save season package for dressing)

Dressing

1/3 cup vinegar

1/2 cup oil

2/3 cup sugar



Combine all with the season package, add to the slaw and marinate overnight. (Or at least a couple of hours)

Mexican Cornbread

1 1/2 cups of cornmeal (self-rising)

1 heaping tablespoon of flour (self-rising)

1 cup buttermilk

1/4 cup oil

2 eggs

1 small can of cream corn (8oz)

Jalapeno Peppers (1/4 cup or less, 1/4 cup has a bite)

Onion

Dash of salt

1 1/2 cup shredded cheddar cheese

Chop peppers and onion to taste

Mix meal, flour, salt and cheese in a bowl.

Add milk, eggs, oil and corn.

Add peppers and onions.

Grease a 9 x 13 pan and bake at 375 for 35 min or until brown.



A SHOT OF WHISKEY: In the old west a .45 cartridge for a six-gun cost 12 cents, so did a glass of whiskey. If a cowhand was low on cash he would often give the bartender a cartridge in exchange for a drink. This became known as a "shot" of whiskey.

THE WHOLE NINE YARDS: American fighter planes in WW2 had machine guns that were fed by a belt of cartridges. The average plane held belts that were 27 feet (9 yards) long. If the pilot used up all his ammo he was said to have given it the whole nine yards.

BUYING THE FARM: This is synonymous with dying. During WW1 soldiers were given life insurance policies worth \$5,000. This was about the price of an average farm so if you died you "bought the farm" for your survivors.

IRON CLAD CONTRACT: This came about from the ironclad ships of the Civil War. It meant something so strong it could not be broken.

PASSING THE BUCK/THE BUCK STOPS HERE: Most men in the early west carried a jack knife made by the Buck knife company. When playing poker it as common to place one of these Buck knives in front of the dealer so that everyone knew who he was. When it was time for a new dealer the deck of cards and the knife were given to the new dealer. If this person didn't want to deal he would "pass the buck" to the next player. If that player accepted then "the buck stopped there".

RIFF RAFF: The Mississippi River was the main way of traveling from north to south. Riverboats carried passengers and freight but they were expensive so most people used rafts. Everything had the right of way over rafts which were considered cheap. The steering oar on the rafts was called a "riff" and this transposed into riff-raff, meaning low class.

COBWEB: The Old English word for "spider" was "cob".

SHIP STATE ROOMS: Traveling by steamboat was considered the height of comfort. Passenger cabins on the boats were not numbered. Instead they were named after states. To this day cabins on ships are called staterooms.

SHOWBOAT: These were floating theaters built on a barge that was pushed by a steamboat. These played small town along the Mississippi River. Unlike the boat shown in the movie "Showboat" these did not have an engine. They were gaudy and attention grabbing which is why we say someone who is being the life of the party is "showboating".

OVER A BARREL: In the days before CPR a drowning victim would be placed face down over a barrel and the barrel would be rolled back and forth in a effort to empty the lungs of water. It was rarely effective. If you are over a barrel you are in deep trouble.

BARGE IN: Heavy freight was moved along the Mississippi in large barges pushed by steamboats. These were hard to control and would sometimes swing into piers or other boats. People would say they "barged in".

HOGWASH: Steamboats carried both people and animals. Since pigs smelled so bad they would be washed before being put on board. The mud and other filth that was washed off was considered useless "hog wash".

CURFEW: The word "curfew" comes from the French phrase "couvre-feu", which means "cover the fire". It was used to describe the time of blowing out all lamps and candles. It was later adopted into Middle English as "curfeu", which later became the modern "curfew". In the early American colonies homes had no real fireplaces so a fire was built in the center of the room. In order to make sure a fire did not get out of control during the night it was required that, by an agreed upon time, all fires would be covered with a clay pot called-a "curfew".

On January 13th we visited the TN-M Lenoir City chapter gathering, along with Wally, who presented them with the plaque they were awarded by the Pediatric Brain Tumor Foundation for their over \$1,000 contribution to the 2014 Eastern Tennessee Ride for Kids.

Then on Saturday, the 17th of January we combined two visits into a long day by first attending the TN-Y, Murfreesboro chapter gathering, then after a nice drive in the sunny weather, attended the TN-S, Portland chapter gathering. We're sure many of you will remember what a beautiful day it was that Saturday, bright sunshine and relatively warm weather.

This caused us, or at least me, a little heartache ... for what you say? I was wishing we were on the bike instead of in our car! To add insult, on the drive from Murfreesboro to Portland, then from Portland to home, we saw quite a few motorcycles out, their riders clearly enjoying a bright sunny day for a ride. We probably saw upwards of 100 motorcycles, 3 were crotch-rockets, one BMW, and all the rest were Harley's or Harley look-alikes except for one older GL1100 we saw, and one GL1800 that was ridden by Mike & Cindy Burkett, TN District Motorist Awareness Coordinator and District Treasurer, who rode to those same two chapter gatherings.

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Lets go Visiting

The Murfreesboro chapter gathering is set up to eat at 8am and meet at 9am CST, so even though we decided to eat breakfast at home and just plan to get there in time for the meeting portion, we still had to leave home at 6:30am our time, and it was only 28 degrees then. That temperature and that long of a ride, not quite 200 miles to Murfreesboro, then the about 90 miles to Portland, then the around 200 miles back home, was more than we wanted to try on a bike, so we kept to our trusty "quadra-cycle".

Anyway, we enjoyed attending the two chapter gatherings and renewing our friendships with so many of our fellow TN GWRRA members. And at the two gatherings there were a lot more chapters also visiting ... we hadn't realized it, but TN-Y had the TN District Couple of the Year Traveling plaque (which was captured by the TN-L 2015 Couple of the Year), and TN-S had the Region N and TN District Traveling plaques. There were not enough members from any one chapter at TN-S to qualify to capture either of their plaques (there has to be at least 5 members for those two plagues, and then it is determined by total miles), so they get to keep them for another month and they will again be available at their next gathering, Feb 21st. If any TN-B members would be willing to go with us, we'd love to arrange a group to try for them, and we'd have a pretty good chance as there is only one other chapter, TN-C Kingsport, that is farther away.

And finally, on Monday, January 19th, we visited the TN-A2 Maryville chapter. They had quite a crowd there also, we didn't realize it but they had the Eastern TN Traveling Plaque (which is a

ticket draw selection), so there were 6 members from TN-F Morristown and 2 members from TN-M Lenoir City there, along with Loretta & I from TN-B. Unfortunately we were not lucky enough to get our ticket picked to "win" the plaque, it went to TN-L, but maybe we can get lucky at Lenoir City next month.

At all four of these visits, we talked up our 21st Annual Chili Cook-Off, hoping to drum up more participants for our fund-raising event, the more the merrier for all the fun, as well as the funds for our chapter's worthwhile charities. Being as far away as they are, and with the planned TN-L Lebanon LTP Training day the same day as our Cook-Off, we're not sure if many of the TN-Y and TN-S members will come, but there was a good amount of interest from the members of TN-A2 and TN-F, and I handed out all the flyers that I had taken with us, so hopefully we will get a good group from them.

Tech Advisor Section—devoted to the care and upkeep of your Motorcycle or Trike

Over the years I've heard many members make two complaints about the headlights on their GL1800, one is that the two headlights are not lined up, in that one is pointing higher than the other, and the second complaint is that the two headlights are aimed either too high or too low and the adjustment switch on the fairing does not allow for enough adjustment to get them low enough or

high enough, respectively. The issue here is that most GL1800 owners do not know that there is a second adjustment method for the two headlights. I am going to do my best to explain to you where to find that adjustment capability (it is relatively easy to find when you know where to look) and how to use it. This procedure applies to either a 2-wheeled or 3-wheeled GL1800.

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Tech Advisor Section—devoted to the care and upkeep of your Motorcycle or Trike

First, standing in front of the bike, get down and look up under the front of the fairing, along the fork tubes. If you look in the right place you will see a 12mm bolt facing straight down (to the right is a photo of the area with arrows to help you identify what you need to be seeing). There are two of those bolts, one on each side of the fairing, for each of the two headlights. Once you have located them, we can go on to what to do for adjustment. Facing the front of the bike this picture is of the right side, you can see the fork tube with the pinch bolt and directly "above" and to the right of the pinch bolt in the picture, is a black area with numbers on it and "below" that is the headlight adjustment hex bolt.

For either of the following adjustment processes, the best way to do this is to park your 2-wheel bike on its center-stand, or just move your trike, in front of a wall that is clear and you can easily see where each of the two headlights are pointing by where the center point of the light on the wall is.

Under the first scenario where the headlights are not aligned evenly horizontally (one is pointing higher than the other), once you have the bike lined up and can see the center point of each light shining on the wall, you can easily see where one is higher than the other. Now is where you get into the adjustment phase. Determine which of the headlights, left or right as you face the front of the bike, is lower than the other, and focus on the adjustment bolt for that side. Using a 12mm socket on a long extension bar with a ratchet, attach the socket to the end of the appropriate adjustment bolt and turn the ratchet as if you were tightening a bolt, that will raise that light's aiming position (it may take quite a few turns, there is a LOT of adjustment in that bolt, a LOT of turns to move the headlight positioning). Work the ratchet while watching the light on the wall and continue adjusting the center of beam upwards until it is lined up evenly with the light from the other headlight. Obviously turning the bolt as if you were loosening a bolt lowers the aim point.

Now for the second scenario, where you have noticed that the headlights are aimed too low - even using the normal adjustment switch on the fairing to move them to their highest position they still are shining only just in front of the bike onto the highway and not going out very far, or they are too high - even using the normal adjustment switch on the fairing to move them to their lowest position they still are still shining too high up into the trees or directly into the rearview mirror of the car you are following, totally irritating the driver in front of you, not a good thing to do, we don't want to anger the driver at us.

Again position the bike in front of a clear wall that you can see the headlights on the wall. I have found the best way to do this is to use masking tape. Using the normal adjustment switch on the fairing, move the aim to the highest position, and put a piece of tape on the wall with a mark where the center line of both beams hit (you HAVE already lined them up so they are horizontally even, right?). Now adjust the headlights to their lowest position and put a second piece of tape on the wall with a mark where the center line of both beams hit. I figure the optimum configuration is to determine the center point of those two marks so that you can adjust the aim to that point, allowing you to have the best possible adjustment option for normal use, so put another piece of tape with a mark for the "center" position of the adjustment switch.

For the situation of the headlights aimed too low, if you already know that at their highest position, they are still too low, you want to move their aim point to some point above the highest mark on the wall, how far above the mark depends on how much "too low" they are. Put a piece of tape on the wall with a mark where you THINK you want the center point to be, keeping in mind that you want their lowest point to be above the current highest point on the wall. One headlight at a time, using the under-the-fairing adjustment bolt, move the center point of the beam up to the mark you made. If the headlights are aimed too high, just reverse this procedure.


This is somewhat of a trial and error situation, you need to make these adjustments, then you need to take the bike out on a night ride and see how it is out on the road. After checking it out, you may need to do some fine-tuning, but you now know what to do and how to do it.

If you have any questions about any of this, please feel free to contact me and I will do all I can to help. I have done this procedure on quite a few fellow members' bikes, and it sounds complicated but it is really fairly simple.

And as I mentioned in last month's article, if you think of ideas that you have used in the past that helped you maintain your motorcycle, made it easier to use and enjoy,

etc., please consider sending them to me so I can forward them on in subsequent articles. We all can help each other fully enjoy our favorite pastime.

RA members joining us for a good time.





Walking past your hibernating bike in the garage might stir a few thoughts this time of year. This would be a good time to take a few minutes to give your bike a good visual inspection in preparation for the upcoming riding season. Take a good look at your tires to check for wear or foreign objects that might make it necessary to order up replacements. If accessible, take a look for worn brake pads and rotors. A light rust coat on the rotors is normal after a long period of storage and not normally a problem.

Check your owners' manual and maintenance log to see if your bike is due for a particular service soon. Maybe you got a particular item of "safety chrome" for the bike at Christmas time that needs to be installed. The current "off season" might be just the time to get these maintenance items or modifications installed. Aftermarket parts suppliers and most dealerships are slow this time of year, so maybe it's time to beat the springtime rush!




