Throwing a Curve at Curves – Counter Steering

Okay, okay! I know many of you are now on three wheels and counter steering is a technique only applicable to riding a motorcycle but I still thought it would be a good topic to address. Why? Because nobody told me about counter-steering until just a couple of years ago! No kidding! You might ask how I rode curves before I knew this technique. Well, I am a pretty big guy and relatively strong and for years I went around curves primarily leaning and 'manhandling' (known as 'counter weighting) my bike instead of counter steering. I may have been subconsciously counter steering to some degree but not much. So, what is counter steering? There is a ton of physics involved in counter steering and a thorough description would involve using words like camber, thrust, roll angle and centripetal force but I'm not going to go into all the science. I'm just going to talk about the concept and how to do it.

Essentially, counter steering is a technique used by motorcycle riders when navigating curves that uses the movement of the handlebars to turn the bike instead of shifting their weight and forcing the bike to lean. The concept is simple. As a rider approaches a curve, they steer the handlebars in the opposite direction of the turn they are making causing the bike to automatically lean into the direction of the curve. For example, if you are entering into a right-hand curve you would turn the handlebars to the left. When you do this the motorcycle will lean to the right and therefore follow a right-hand path around the curve. The benefits of counter steering are many but the two primary benefits are control and a reduction of physical effort on the rider. A rider adept at counter steering will have more control over their motorcycle in a curve and will experience far less riding fatigue. If you have not been using counter steering as you navigate curves here are a few tips on how to start using this technique.

- 1) Find a Safe Road to Practice On: Find a road that has nice gradual curves and isn't too busy. If you have never used this technique you should not try to learn on tight, windy roads initially or roads with a lot of traffic.
- 2) Trust the Physics: When I say 'turn the handlebars' really what you are doing is 'pushing' forward on the handlebar on the side you want to turn into (i.e. push forward on the right handlebar to navigate a right hand curve). It doesn't take much pressure to begin to turn your bike so apply pressure gradually and if the bike begins to turn too hard ease up and it will come back in line.
- 3) Practice, Practice: I have already admitted that no-

body taught me this technique until recently (probably because I never took a class and rode with groups) and living and riding in East Tennessee has given me PLENTY of practice. Last Fall Hedie and I took a weekend and we rode the Tail of the Dragon and then continued up to Mt. Pisgah Inn on the Blue Ridge Parkway. Curves? Yeah, just a few.

I hope this has helped either serve as a reminder about how to counter steer or maybe, like me, help someone who never knew about this technique to begin practicing and using it. Bring on the curves!

Key Fob Battery Replacement is not a hard task— almost anyone can do it you simply take a knife or screwdriver by the key ring end and insert in the groove and with a prying motion separate the two halves. After that, you will find the battery with size on top lift out and install new one in the same orientation. The fob uses a CR2025 battery. Then just snap the covers back together and then test by walking up to your bike and see if turn signals flash and trunk locks and unlocks. If you need to reprogram, here are the instructions.

HONDA GOLDWING KEY FOB REMOTES STEP-BY-STEP HOW TO PROGRAMMING INSTRUCTIONS

Minutes 5 minutes

Enter Programming Mode – Step 1

INSERT key and TURN the Ignition to the ON position.

Enter Programming Mode - Step 2

WITHIN 3 seconds PRESS the Trunk "Pop-Up" Button on the remote while aiming the remote at the trunk

Enter Programming Mode - Step 3

WITHIN 3 seconds TURN the Ignition to the OFF position.

Enter Programming Mode - Step 4

REPEAT Steps 1-3 an additional 3 times.

Enter Programming Mode – Step 5

AFTER 3 cycles, LEAVE the Ignition switch in the ON position.

Program Remote

WITHIN 15 seconds, AIM the remote you want programmed at the Trunk and PRESS the Trunk "Pop -Up" Button once for each remote to be programmed.

Exit Programming Mode

WITHIN 3 seconds, TURN the Ignition to the OFF position to EXIT Programming Mode.

Motorcycle Laws in Tennessee



Red Light Exception May proceed through light after stopping completely at intersections controlled by detection devices. If a crash occurs, the motorcycle going through the light is presumed at fault

Windshield, Goggles, Glasses Windshield, goggles, impact resistant glasses, or face shield are required.

Helmets are required Approved helmets: DOT (FMVSS 218 Certified), CSPM, SNELL, SIRC

Display of Registration Must be attached to the rear, securely fastened in horizontal position, and no less than 12 inches from the ground. If a motorcycle is equipped with vertically mounted license plate brackets, its license plate shall be mounted with the top of the license plate fastened along the right vertical edge. No tinted materials may be placed over a license plate.

Headlights One or a maximum of two headlights, and must remain on at all times. Modulating headlights are legal. No blue lights can be displayed in the front

Tail lights / Brake lights Flashing system is legal. Must flash for five seconds then change to continuous light and must be red in color

Seat for operator and passenger required No person (child) can ride in a position that interferes with controls, i.e., in front of the operator. No minimum age for child to ride as a passenger. Must be able to sit on seat provided with feet touching stock foot pegs/boards.

H.O.V. Lanes Motorcycles are high occupancy vehicles and may use H.O.V. lane.

Entitled to full use of lane. May not overtake and pass in lane occupied by another vehicle. Two motorcycles may ride abreast. May not operate between adjacent lanes or rows/split lanes.

A little Tennessee history...

Sequoyah was an uneducated, crippled Cherokee half breed who was shunned by his peers for much of his life until, in 1821, he introduced an alphabet to his people. It was so easy to learn that soon thousands were using it. Before long the Cherokees were more literate than most of the white men living in the area.

Sequoyah is the only man to single-handedly develop and perfect an alphabet. In doing so he endorsed an entire nation with learning. The story of Sequoyah is told in the SEQUOYAH BIRTHPLACE MUSEUM, which is located south of Vonore on Highway 36 and is owned and operated by the Eastern Band of Cherokee Indians. The only Indian-operated historical attraction in Tennessee, it's located on the shores of Tellico Lake, 37 miles south of downtown Knoxville on Highway 360.

The museum is dedicated to this brilliant Native American, but it also tells a great deal about the Cherokee as a nation. Displays range from Native American artifacts to a present-day Blondie comic book written in the Cherokee alphabet.

Along Highway 11 a few miles from Sweetwater lies the little town of Niota. The main attraction here is the Niota Depot, the oldest standing railroad depot in the state. Built in 1853.
