A few tips for riding in the rain Like most riders you probably avoid riding in the rain, but we all know that showers and downpours can pop up unexpectedly. And as we all know a trip which is at least 3 to 5 days (or longer) will undoubtedly produce some rain.

- 1. Stay comfortable. Good fitting waterproof gear that works will make the rain experience more comfortable. Try to get gear that packs small and is easy to put on and take off.
- 2. Keep a clear shield. Without wipers we usually must turn our heads left and right at speed to get our visor to clear or get riding gloves that have a built-in squeegee.
- 3. Be seen. Bright colors can help being seen when the skies turn gloomy and especially when the rain starts. Be sure that all your lights are working and signal early before reducing speed, so you won't get rear ended. Keep an eye out for low spots in the road where water can puddle or hide debris.
- 4. Ride smart. Slowing down to minimize the risk of hydroplaning is a good idea. This applies not only to 2 wheelers but more importantly to trikes which are more prone to hydroplaning. Also, a slower speed will allow you to have more time and space to react to hazards. When rain first starts it reacts with road grime and oil droppings and that is when the pavement is very slippery reducing the traction of all vehicles. But as you may recall, your bike's tires only put down a footprint that is only about the size of your palm. Always be careful with road paint, railroad tracks, tar snakes, and metal construction plates that are just waiting to cause you trouble.
- 5. Be smooth. There can be a surprising amount of grip on wet roads, but it is always important to be smooth and recognize that traction is indeed reduced compared to dry conditions. Those of you on 2 wheels should reduce lean angle in the curves when the road is wet. And something that applies to ALL motorcycles is DO NOT use your cruise control while riding in the rain. The result could be deadly.


Couple Of The Month

OUR VIKING JOURNEY

We departed Knoxville on August 28, 2021, flying to Philadelphia and then to Amsterdam. We were met at the airport by a Viking representative and shuttled to the Renaissance Blu Hotel where we were joined by Tom's sister and her husband who flew in from Ohio. Having decided to spend a couple of days in Amsterdam to sightsee, we took a canal cruise and walked around the city dodging bicycles all the while.

The streets were cobblestone, quite old. We noticed many Argentine restaurants and grills, lots of coffee shops, bakeries, etc. Most baked items contained some sort of marijuana, so we passed. It was obvious that it was being smoked openly. Sidewalks were filled with wall-to-wall people walking, but where were they going in such a hurry? Bicycles in the streets, on the sidewalks, EVERYWHERE. Toddlers riding behind parents and in small carts attached to the bikes. Many tall women! Almost a million people in this city. Amsterdam is below sea level, and they have what they call "dancing houses". To us, they were houses that looked tilted. They were built all connected to each other and quite colorful and very old. It looked like there was no danger of them falling over. The sky was overcast and the weather cool and windy. Great buffet breakfasts the 2 mornings at the hotel. The 2nd day, we took a guided 2 ½ hour walking tour of the city, seeing permanent houseboats on the canals where people set up camp for years. The houseboats were connected to the city's sewer system.

Our Viking representatives met us at our hotel, and we were shuttled to the Viking Ship Gefjon. The Viking riverboats are called "longships". Our ship was 442' long and 37 ½' wide with 3 decks plus a sundeck. Our ship was built in 2015 and looked brand new. This would be our home for the next 2 weeks and it was looking GOOD. The ship's staff was warm and welcoming, and we were shown to our stateroom. Others were boarding and we were free to tour the ship and check out our new surroundings. We had the first of many wonderful meals in the dining room that evening. Faintly, we heard the engines start up and we were underway. So smooth and QUIET. This is sailing at its best! Starting out on the Rhine River, then the Main, the Danube, for our journey from Amsterdam to Budapest, stopping at 12 cities along the way, and the countries of the Netherlands, Germany, Austria, and Hungary. Our ship would navigate through 68 locks along the way.

The first day of sailing, the Gefjon stopped at Kinder Dijk, and we took a walking tour of the windmills and went inside one. Beautiful wood on the walls. The "miller" who lived in it was very hospitable and proud to show us his home. It is said there were some families of 14 who lived in these at one time. Wall openings for adults and drawers for babies and children were used for beds. Wall openings were short as people always sat up to sleep, thinking that a horizontal position related too closely to death.

Upon awaking Thursday, we were docked at Cologne, Germany. The massive cathedral we toured was breathtaking, they started building it in the year 1248 and took over 600 yrs. to complete, by this time it was 1880. Amazing architecture and beauty within. Walked across a bridge that spanned the Rhine past the "locks", which were thousands of padlocks attached to a chain link fence on one side of the bridge, very colorful. Wow. How many years did it take to fill in this fence all the way across the bridge? Now, there are locks attached to locks connected to original locks!

Koblenz, Germany: We toured a massive castle on our walking tour red berry iced tea was refreshing!

Miltenberg, Germany Walking tour I enjoyed roast duck for dinner on the ship.

Now cruising on the Main River with the Rhine behind us

Wurzburg, Germany: Toured the Residence (enormous) of French bishops Low of 50/High of 80 degrees today I sipped Black Lemon Iced Tea for the first time

Bamberg, Germany: A fun city, lots of shops. Cruised through the Main-Danube Canal

Nuremberg, Germany

Regensburg, Germany Walking tours in every city/some motorcoach Passau, Germany

Melk, Austria Scenic cruising through Wachau Valley Krems, Austria



Vienna, Austria Beautiful city of almost 2 million people. Rode motorcoach from ship into the city. Then free time to go into the churches and to shop. Walked through the city museum and saw the Lipizzaner Stallions in their stalls housed in the palace as we walked through the courtyard of the Palace. Vienna is preparing for the world's largest marathon here tomorrow. While on the motorcoach, we noticed lots of fencing being placed strategically along the sidewalks in preparation for the race. Beautiful city. Flowers everywhere. We were docked here in Vienna 2 days, departing for Budapest at 5 p.m. the second day.

Budapest, Hungary: We toured another huge church. Beautiful stained-glass windows, which were carefully removed before the war bombings and then replaced after the war. Last chance for shopping, so many were making last minute purchases of souvenirs.

As you will note, not much is written for the last cities we visited. We were so busy, or I was too tired to journal each day and just fell into bed. Each city visited was unique and a pure delight.

The meals on the ship were unbelievable. All freshly prepared and we tried many new dishes. Fantastic desserts and exquisite presentation! Our program director, Boris, was a lively outgoing man that kept us all motivated every afternoon to "get ready" for the next day's fun. No one could have done his job better! Each afternoon, Andre played an electronic piano in the lounge, and we had comfortable seating with wall-to-wall windows or viewing the countryside as we quietly cruised the river. At 9 p.m. each evening was continued music or games. A handblown glass expert came on board, classical music by piano and clarinet one night, always something to do, or you could sit quietly in the AquaFit terrace area and play cards.

Note: We felt very safe from covid on the Viking riverboat. Prior to going, each passenger had to show proof of vaccine and have a covid test 72 hours before boarding a plane. Every morning on the ship, each of us had to spit in a personal vial, place into a marked envelope and drop off at the main desk.

We, laughingly, would ask each other, "Did you spit yet?" These were sent out to a lab every day. On the last day, we were provided with a hard copy of that day's test result and could use this before boarding a plane at Budapest to return to the States. Our stateroom and the entire ship were super clean. Everyone wore masks except while eating or drinking and in our own stateroom. While on the tours, masks were worn on the buses and inside buildings or shops. The guides wore masks continuously as did the ship's staff.

The last night on the Gefjon, our luggage had to be outside our door by 4 a.m. Breakfast was available quite early for those departing for earlier flights. We were shuttled to the airport and 2 Viking reps. Stayed with us until we arrived at our gate. Tom and I flew to Munich, Germany, then a 9 ½ hour flight to Washington, D.C., then a connecting flight to Knoxville, Tennessee. HOME!

What a trip! Beautiful scenery and terrific weather the whole time. I didn't realize Germany would be so picturesque. All the fields, crops, vineyards were tidy and pristine. Seeing both sides of the river we were cruising, feeling the quiet solitude of God's creative wonders. Absolutely overwhelming and the precious memories will be held dear for our lifetime.

For those of you who might be wondering about a recommendation...we do not have one (1) complaint about Viking.... not one. We were treated royally from beginning to end.

The only thing that could have made this trip better is that all our Chapter B family could have been right there with us!
