






So some of you may recall a few months ago I offered some suggested items to carry in your saddlebag / trunk for roadside emergencies. I recently read an article that offered a slightly different array of small but necessary items that you may want to consider adding to your emergency collection. Some of these may seem like repeats, but what the heck, many of us have short attention spans and often need reminders.

- 1. A good compact first aid kit. These are available at a variety of stores and should include adhesive bandages, first aid and burn cream, misc. medications, wound cleaner, and a first aid manual (for most of us who forgot stuff from the class).
- 2. A Zipstitch Laceration Kit. Lacerations happen. Now don't get me wrong, I'm not trying to make you into amateur surgeons, but how many times have we been on recent rides when at a gas or food stop out in nowhere land have you noticed that your cell phone shows "NO SERVICE"? How would you repair a good sized laceration? Get one of these kits and tuck it into your first aid kit as cheap insurance.
- 3. Gorilla Tape. Forget about duct tape. This stuff is the real deal. It's more adhesive,more weather resistant, and easier to work with. It's perfect for patching torn gear, seats, or saddlebags. And now, it's available in smaller rolls that don't take up much room in your bag.
- 4. J-B Weld Steelstik. Asphalt loves nothing more than to grind through an engine case. This epoxy putty is perfect for quick fixes, setting in five minutes and curing completely in around one hour. It can also tolerate heat of up to 300 degrees Fahrenheit. Have a hole larger than the epoxy alone can contend with? Get creative. Pennies make great filler.
- 5. Zip ties. Our generation's duct tape, zip ties are the ultimate multitool. Keep a few dozen hidden away in your emergency bag. Thay can stitch together body panels, secure lights, hold boxes closed, and secure almost anything on your bike.
- 6. Silicone Sealing Tape. Used by the U.S. Military this stuff can handle up to 500 degrees Fahrenheit and 950 psi, which means it's perfect for repairing punctured radiator hoses. It's also a great insulator, and when wrapped around damaged wiring, it can keep aggravated shorts at bay.
- 7. Mechanic's wire. If it can't be glued, taped, or zip tied, it can probably be wired together. And in a pinch, wire can replace missing panel bolts, keeping things in place until you can find a hardware store. No need to bring a whole roll, peel off a small coil and pack it into your emergency bag.

I hope these suggestions help to save your day sometime in the future. Until later, ride safer!








Explanation of the GWRRA Rider Education Levels Program...

Anatomy of an Accident

or

What I learned on the way to Nova Scotia

"I'm at Travis Road and US 1." "I need an ambulance and police right NOW." "I've hit a motorcycle and I didn't see them," "I'm so sorry." Someone was speaking on a cell phone, but I couldn't see him. He must have been behind me, for as I opened my eyes, all I could see was the Goldwing leaned over toward me at a funny angle—but very quiet. What had just happened.?

Is was a Thursday, the 4th day of a scheduled 18 day trip to the Atlantic Canada District Rally in Yarmouth Nova Scotia and we were 1100 miles from home. We were traveling with Tom and Merrilee Peck and had already had two glorious days in Niagara Falls and were traveling through Maine. We stopped for lunch in Freeport, and made the obligatory stop at the original LL Bean store (open 24/7) which is a a tourist attraction in it's own right.

As we left Freeport on US 1A, I noticed that I-295 had a 6 mile traffic jam up ahead, so we decided to take US 1 all the way to Machias Maine, our scheduled overnight stop. We were on the outskirts of Augusta, and the traffic was suddenly very heavy—stop and go on all four lanes.. I suppose a lot of folks had the same idea about taking US 1 instead of I 295, We were in the right hand lane when the US 1 bypass turned left so we had to continue through the central business district. No worries—being a history buff, I was happy to see the home town of Joshua Lawrence Chamberlin, the hero of Little Round Top at the Battle of Gettysburg.

The GPS routed us through town and we turned right to descend down the ramp to merge on to US 1 which at that point had become a limited access divided highway. I remember checking the mirror to see if Tom had made the turn. I was looking up the road and saw that the lane continued straight when suddenly I was looking into the front wheel well of a red car. I grabbed the brakes for all I was worth and I must have shut my eyes.

I remember a sensation like falling off waterskis as you hit the water and then decelerate to stop,

Then quiet.

I sensed that Betty was behind me for I was on my left side. My right hand really hurt. "Honey, are you all right?" I think so, but my hand really hurts. I rolled over onto my back and there was Tom looking down at me—"Dave, Please tell my you are OK" Then sirens coming from several different directions.



In the weeks since that Thursday, I have replayed that scene in my mind countless times. What could I have done differently?

Here's what I do know:



—rider education WORKS! When it mattered, I acted instinctiveas I was trained in numerously RE courses.

—safety gear WORKS! Other than Betty's hand fracture, We didn't get a scratch because we committed many years ago to the level IV creed of "All the Gear All The Time" (even when it's hot)

—-ABS WORKS! I was able to apply maximum braking without ever worrying about wheel lockup.



I've been riding for over 60 years, and that was my first time on the ground from a street bike.

I should have been more alert—heavy traffic, rush hour, 4:30 in the afternoon —I never saw the car until I was looking into his wheel opening—and then WHAM!! It was that sudden.

The time to prepare for an accident scene is way before it happens.



Motorcycle accessories

Everyone who owns a Goldwing tend to do thing to make them their own wither it is a set of baker air wings or a ram accessory mount or adding chrome or lights The thing you need to keep in mind is proper placement and installation. For example wiping down a surface with alcohol prior to installing anything with two sided tape will help it to adhere to the surface that way the chrome stays where you put it or the strip of lights. Most manufactures recommend this as it removes unnecessary wax or contaminants from the surface.

Mounting on Handle bars should be carefully looked at as to what you mount on the handle-bars . You should never put anything that will hinder the full range of movement of the handlebars.

Mounting items elsewhere you should look a size and placement take a few moments set on the bike have someone to hold it or temporarily place it in your desired spot and think can I see my gauges? Is it going to be in the way of the steering hitting it? Can I see the road good? Can it be placed securely? These are key factors when placing items on a motorcycle.
